We give you thanks for Jesus Christ, our Lord, who by his life, death, and resurrection opened to us the works of grace. Therefore, we join our voices with all the saints and angels and the whole creation to proclaim the glory of your name:

> Holy, holy, holy Lord; God of power and might, praise be the name of the Lord and manifest your Spirit among us.

Let your perfect love drive out fear; make us perfect in your love. Fill our minds with your peace and turn our eyes to heaven, where Christ is at your right-hand interceding for us.

Enable us to offer up ourselves in service to Christ and to all your creation. Let no trouble or sorrow distract us from this loving service, and unite us with each other through your Spirit so that we may continue in the living hope of our Savior's.

We give thanks to God the Father that the Savior, Jesus Christ, before he suffered, gave us this memorial of his sacrifice: The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me."
